

Ramsar Convention

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- India added another feather in its cap when four more sites two each from Haryana and Gujarat were recognised as wetlands of international importance under the Ramsar Convention.
- Sultanpur National Park in Gurgaon and Bhindawas Wildlife Sanctuary in Jhajjar (both in Haryana) have been added to the list this year. Apart from that, **Thol and Wadhwana from Gujarat** too have now become a part of the convention.
- Haryana's **Bhindawas Wildlife Sanctuary is a human-made freshwater wetland. It is also the largest in Haryana.** The Sultanpur National Park supports more than 220 species of resident, winter migratory and local migratory waterbirds at critical stages of their life cycles.
- The Thol Lake Wildlife Sanctuary in Gujarat lies on the Central Asian Flyway and more than 320 bird species can be found here. Meanwhile, the Wadhvana Wetland in Gujarat is internationally important for its birdlife as it provides wintering ground to migratory waterbirds, including over 80 species that migrate on the Central Asian Flyway.
- The Ramsar Convention on Wetlands is an intergovernmental treaty adopted on February 2, 1971 in the Iranian city of Ramsar, on the southern shore of the Caspian Sea. It came into force for India on February 1, 1982.
